

TIBETAN FOOTBALL TOURNAMENT, DHARAMSALA INDIA by Cathy, TFG Committee Member

The Australian Tibetan Communities of Australia Football Team recently returned from participating in the Gyalyum Chenmo Memorial (GCM) Gold Cup in Dharamshala, India. The GCM Gold Cup is a prestigious football tournament for Tibetan communities living in exile and scattered worldwide. It was first held in 1981, in loving memory of the late Great Mother (*Gyalyum Chemo*) of His Holiness the Dalai Lama. In addition to the Tibetan spectators that attend the annual tournament in India, the live telecast of matches is aired through Tibet TV and on social media and enjoyed by thousands of Tibetans worldwide, including the Tibetan communities in Australia.

Although Tibetans have lived in Australia since the early 1970s, this year was the first time the community in Australia has participated in the tournament. The 13 players aged between 16 and 30 years, live in Newcastle, Sydney, Canberra and Melbourne. Apart from one, all the players arrived in Australia as refugees in the last seven years.

The tournament was held at the Tibetan Children's Village (TCV) in upper Dharamshala where TFG sponsors many children. For the players who had been students or a teacher at the school, it was a special opportunity for them to reconnect with their house parents and teachers. Several cultural and spiritual events were also organised for the team, with the highlight being an audience with His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama.

The Australian team quickly became a crowd favourite at the tournament, with the local Tibetans enthusiastically cheering the team with "Aussie Aussie Aussie Oi Oi Oi." The team mascot, a fighting kangaroo, was also a crowd-pleaser. Many local monks attended the games and were very eager to have photos with the players and the Australian volunteers who accompanied the team. The volunteers included a TFG management committee member. Despite having only played once as a team before departing Australia, the team reached the quarter-finals, which was an outstanding achievement.

Debating is usually held in an outside court-yard area

Monastic debate is of critical importance in traditional Tibetan Buddhist learning. The practice of debate takes many years to master fully and is critical to the nuns' ability to assume roles as fully qualified teachers of their tradition.

Through debate, nuns test and consolidate their classroom learning. Without training and practice in debate they are unable to attain higher academic degrees. Until recently, Tibetan nuns did not have the opportunity to fully study and practise Tibetan Buddhist debate, a process that uses logical enquiry to build a deeper understanding of Buddhist philosophy. The Tibetan Nuns Project has worked hard to make this opportunity available to nuns by including debate as a core part of their education, which enables them to extend their use of logic and deepen their understanding of the arguments asserted in the texts they are studying and obtain academic degrees such as the Geshema degree.



DEBATING CHAMPIONSHIP!

"Opening up education to the women, particularly in conjunction with training in debate, has been transformative for the nuns," says <u>Dr. Elizabeth Napper</u>, US Founder and Board Chair of the Tibetan Nuns Project. "Not only have they been given access to the full intellectual richness of their Buddhist tradition but also, through debate, they have been trained to actively engage with it in a way that gives them confidence in their knowledge. Their body language changes from the traditional meekness of nuns to that of women who occupy space with confidence in their right to do so."

A lovely quote from from Dasel Doctor of Delek Hospital

"The special thing about Delek is the culture. I call it Delek Culture. Delek is a very special place. The nurses and staff are so dedicated, so compassionate. They will try their best to give you not only the medical care – they also give psychosocial, emotional, every possible care. Some of their patients have no help, no family so nurses will cook for them. If someone is not able to take solid food, they will make porridge. It is not asked by someone or told by someone or discussed during morning rounds. It is spontaneous."

The audience appreciated the high-octane performance the artists gave at the auspicious event.

RARE HONOUR FOR TIPA ARTISTS IN HUNGARY FOR THE NATIONAL THEATRE OLYMPICS

The Tibetan Institute of Performing Arts (TIPA), with 22 tour members led by director Dhondup Tsering and artistic director Tenzin Phuntsok, participated in the 10th National Theatre Olympics, Budapest, Hungary at their invitation.

Soon after the opening ceremony, TIPA played the condensed version of the opera Nangsa Obum to suit the event's format. Subtitles in English and Hungarian were provided for the convenience of the international audience. The theatre was full to its capacity of over 600 people who sat through the show spellbound in profound silence and deep fascination. At the end of the show, the entire audience, save none, gave a standing and thundering applause. The audience was appreciative of Tibetan Opera as it had a strong moral of cultivating love and compassion which the world needs at this juncture. The play was live broadcast and thousands enjoyed it virtually from across the world.

This was a rare honour and privilege for TIPA to showcase the rich tradition to an international audience and spread the message of world peace as advocated by His Holiness the Dalai Lama.
