TIBETAN PRAYER FLAGS

In case you ever wondered you don't have to be a Buddhist to hang prayer flags! Often you see them hung on verandas or outside homes. Motivation and intentions are what is important and they should be treated with respect. Hang them with a wish for all beings to be free of suffering and the causes of suffering, or for a positive intention of your choice.

Tibetan prayer flags are used to promote peace, compassion, strength, and wisdom. Tibetans believe the prayers and mantras printed on the flags will be spread by the wind and bring goodwill and compassion to benefit all beings. They consider prayer flags to be holy. The flags contain sacred texts and symbols and they should not touch the ground or be put in the rubbish. When disposing of old prayer flags, they should be burned so that the smoke may carry their blessings to the heavens. Traditionally they are hung on a straight or diagonal line between two objects and in high places such as the tops of temples, monasteries, stupas, and mountain passes.

Tibetan prayer flags come in sets of five, with one flag in each of the five colours. The colours from left to right are in this specific order: blue, white, red, green, and yellow. Each colour represents an element: blue symbolises the sky and space, white symbolizes the air and wind, red symbolises fire, green symbolises water and yellow symbolises earth.

I'm not sure how this fascination with Tibet started but I think it was in my early 20's, whilst travelling in India I found in the Delhi market an old scroll, looking a bit worse for wear. I took it to the V&A Museum in London as I lived nearby and they said it was a 19th Century thanka of 4-armed Chenresig, the Buddha of Compassion! Of course, I still have it now!

It wasn't until 2004 that I managed to visit Tibet. I was due to go in 2003 on my way to the UK but sadly it was cancelled the day before leaving due to China closing the border – I burst in to tears when the travel agent called me!! My husband said don't worry we'll go next year – and we did! Flying into Lhasa over the Himalayas from Kathmandu with Buddha Air was the most emotional experience- almost like I was going home. The fabled Potala, home of the Dalai Lamas, was high on my list and my first sighting of this amazing building, from the rooftop of the Jokhang Temple, rising organically from the hillside overlooking Lhasa, brought tears to my eyes. His Holiness had lived there! How must he have felt secretly leaving Lhasa, his home, and his people, not knowing if he would ever return?

The Potala, now a museum and visitor attraction, was built in the 16th Century as a seat for the Dalai Lamas. Traditionally the white part housed the religious areas and the red part the administration offices. I had very mixed feelings about visiting the personal rooms of the Dalai Lama, which are open to visitors – I felt like an intruder! From the rooftop however it was amazing to see Lhasa spread out below and imagine the young Dalai Lama looking down at his subjects far away and maybe wishing to go down and walk amongst them!



TFG FUND RAISING STALL

After much deliberation the stall was held at Bellingen Market on Saturday 16th September. It was a fine sunny day and TFG had a great spot with lots of exposure. Many people were attracted by the Tibetan prayer flags, and interesting display of books jewellery, bags scarves etc. Some had been to Tibet and were interested to talk about the work of TFG and TFG brochures were on hand to supply information. All these goods for sale were donated by TFG supporters and the grand total OF \$1016.00 was raised. Also, a further \$500 was raised from donated items before the stall was held. A huge thank you to all those who donated goods and helped on the day. These funds will go towards a special project at one of the Settlements TFG supports in India.

Dear Sponsors/Well-wishers,

It was indeed great to hear about your Christmas newsletter. TFG has been our generous supporter for an extended period and STSS would like to thank our sponsors for their unwavering support.

Firstly, let me inform you briefly about STSS's historical background. STSS was established in 1999 to manage the schools erstwhile directly managed by the Department of Education (DoE). Further, it took over all the schools run by the Central Tibetan Schools Administration (CTSA), Delhi in compliance with the government of India. As of now, STSS manages in total 36 schools in which there are approximately 5548 children and around 780 teachers/staff. Hence, STSS has become the largest educational institution in the Tibetan exile community.

The sponsorship payment accrued from the sponsorship will be used mainly for the children's education, healthcare, and other school running expenses. Further, most of our schools follow the Basic Education Policy (BEP) implemented by DoE in 2005 wherein teaching-learning up to class III is being done only in the mother tongue (Tibetan). Teaching-Learning of a second language starts in class IV and a third language from class VI. Additionally, every school has a spiritual teacher who teaches about the importance of secular ethics and also lets the children practice Buddhist reasoning debates. Moreover, STSS has inculcated and preserved our Tibetan language and culture by using only our mother tongue till class III and having a music class wherein the students learn Tibetan musical instruments and wear traditional attire during the music and dance performances. Also, every Wednesday all Tibetans wear traditional clothes and dance Tibetan traditional dance in the evening and try to speak pure Tibetan with each other. There will be a traditional singing and dancing competition among the students wherein they learn and practice Tibetan traditional dance and songs beforehand for the final competition. Then there is Tibet, our country project wherein all teachers/staff and children wear traditional clothes, eat traditional food, and live in a tent to keep our culture and tradition alive. Recently SEE learning (Social, Emotional, and Ethical) was introduced in most of our schools to provide educators with the tools to foster Social, Emotional, and Ethical intelligence in students.

Finally, STSS remains steadfast in our goal to provide free basic education to all our children here in exile India. Also, we look forward to furthering our cooperation in support of our shared goals.

STSS is forever grateful and appreciates your indelible contribution to the sphere of education.
